The Second Middle Passage

Ban on Import of Slaves

NINTH CONGRESS OF THE UNITED STATES:

At the Second Session,

Begun and held at the city of Washington, in the territory of Columbia, on Monday the first of December, one thousand eight hundred and six.

AN ACT to prohibit the importation of slaves, into any port or place within the jurisdiction of the United Grates, from and after the first day of January, in the year of our Gord, one thousand eight hundred and eight.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America, in Congress assembled, That from and after the Just of day of January, one thousand eight hundred and eight hundred not be healt to import or bring into the United States, or the healt to service or labor.

Jen 2. And he it further enacted, That no cityen or citizens of the United States, or any other person, shall, form and after the first day of January, in the year of our Lody one thousand eight hundred and eight, for himself, or thousands, it any other purson whatsoewer, either as master, factor, or owner, build, fet, equip leady or otherwise prepare, any ship or vessel, in any port or place within the jurisdiction of the United States, nor shall cause any ship or vessel to sail from any port or place within the same, for the purpose of precuring any never, mulatio, or person of color, from any forigon lingdom, place or country, to be broad personal to any port or place whatsoever, within the jurisdiction of the Whited States, to be held, sold or disposed of as slaves, or to be held to service or labor; and if any ship or vessel shall be so fitted out, for the purpose aforesaid, or shall be caused to sail so as aforesaid; overy such ship or vessel, his toil to fiftied to the United States, or the sail ship or vessel may be fund or season.






Illustration from 1836 of men and women at work in a textile mill





Cotton Production in the U.S. (In Millions of Pounds)

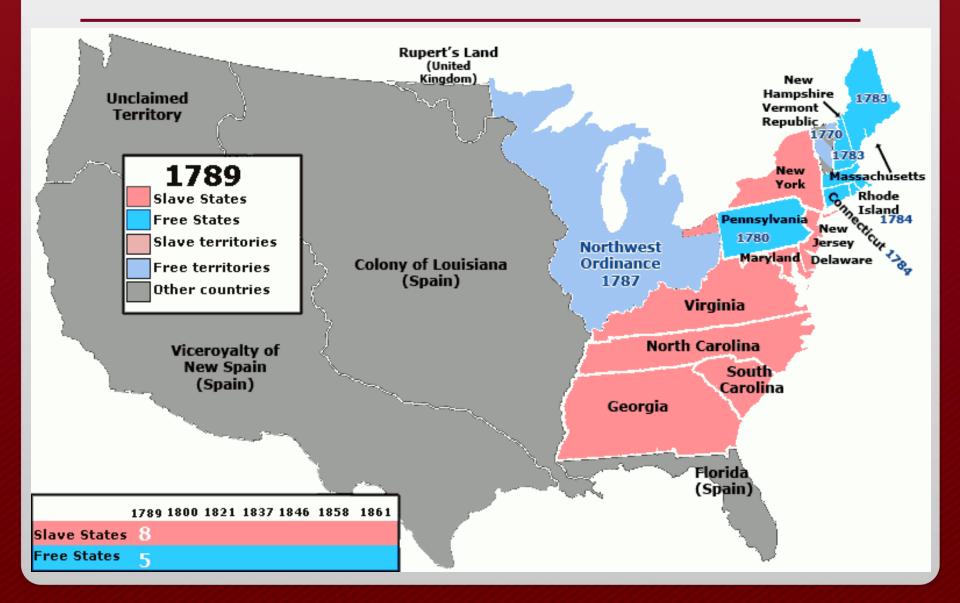
